Direct social work: Advocacy

The social work engaged with advocacy typically relates to the structural pressures and barriers facing a strong community. Phase I of advocacy inevitably relates to the research on the causes of the presumed structural pressure and the estimation of the prospects of eliminating the barriers with the available or presumed resources. For cases of advocacy, the research involves the analysis of institutional causes that lead to the disproportional effects of particular environmental circumstances on the local community, the engagement of the community, and the development of realistic plans for fixing the issue (Cummins & Sevel, 2017). An advocacy social work starts with the engagement of the community that suffers from a social barrier or pressure. This stage features various tactics for attracting the attention and pressuring the opinion of groups that wield power to make a significant difference. The achievement of the initially stated goals constitutes an ultimate victory in the agenda scenario.



Direct provision of social work practice: Case Management

The case management approach to social work implies an analytical twist on standard social work. tWithin the approach of case management, the key task of the social worker is to evaluate the specific feature of the case as compared to other similar cases in the topical social science literature. Such case management simplifies the development of an individualized plan for the object of the social work in a way that would achieve both the most significant impact on the

object and the derivation of specific occupational knowledge for other social workers who would deal with similar cases (Petr, 2003, pp. 71-72).
